




SOME KICK. The London girls are great football enthusiasts. Our kicker is a fullback on the Lyons team of the English city. Central News Photo.

SAW HER BOY'S TEAM WIN. Tris Speaker, manager of the Cleveland baseball team, and his mother at the Cleveland ball park. International.






